The Queensland Certificate of Education

- The QCE is the qualification we hope all students will gain by graduation
- Credits are recorded in students QCAA myQCE Learning Account, this remains open until they are 24 (or until they receive their QCE).
- To gain a QCE, students must have completed a set amount of learning, at a set standard in a set pattern, while also meeting literacy and numeracy requirements

NEW for 2025-2026 senior cohort

+ complete the <u>Academic Integrity online learning course</u> in their *myQCE Learning Account*

QCE requirements

As well as meeting the below requirements, students must have an open learning account before starting the QCE, and accrue a minimum of one credit from a Core course of study while enrolled at a Queensland school.

20 credits from contributing courses of study, including:

- QCAA-developed subjects or courses
- vocational education and training (VET) qualifications
- non-Queensland studies
- recognised studies.



12 credits from completed Core courses of study and 8 credits from any combination of:

- Core
 - Preparatory (maximum 4)
- Complementary (maximum 8).

QCAA developed courses and VET courses

- QCAA has developed syllabuses for General and Applied subjects – run across two years of Senior study – split into <u>four units</u>
- General subjects suited to students interested in pathways beyond Year 12 that lead primarily to tertiary study and to pathways that lead to vocational education and work
- Applied subjects suited to students who are primarily interested in pathways beyond Year 12 that lead to vocational education and training or work
- VET subjects we offer Certificate I, II, III/IV courses



Assessment in QCAA courses and QCE credit

- Assessment in Units 1 and 2 for all subjects will lead to a S (satisfactory completion) or U (unsatisfactory completion) result reported to QCAA
- Unit 1 and Unit 2 are reported as single units
- Assessment in Units 3 and 4 of Applied and General subjects leads to an A to E result at the end of the course – final result end Year 12
- For Units 3 and 4, QCE credits are coupled together as a pair (these cannot be split)



Assessment in General subjects

- Assessment in General subjects for Units 1 and 2 is through school-developed internal assessment
- The Unit 1 and 2 assessment tasks are designed to mirror the Unit 3 and 4 tasks and to develop student readiness for these **summative assessment tasks**
- Assessment in General subjects for Units 3 and 4 is through:
 - 3 x internal assessments (IA)
 - +
 - I x external assessment (EA) at the end of Year 12

External Assessments contribute:

- 50% for Science and Mathematics subjects
- 25% for all other general subjects



Assessment in Applied subjects

- Assessment in Applied subjects for Units 1 and 2 is through schooldeveloped internal assessment
- The Unit 1 and 2 assessment tasks are designed to mirror the Unit 3 and 4 tasks and to develop student readiness for **summative assessment tasks**
- Assessment in Applied subjects for Units 3 and 4 is through:
 - 4 x internal assessments (IA)

However:

In **Essential Mathematics** and **Essential English**, one of the internal assessments in Unit 3 is a *Common Internal Assessment*, this task is developed by QCAA but marked by the school.

VET courses and QCE credits

- The vocational courses offered at Shalom are competency-based with results recorded as Competency Achieved or Not Yet Competent
- Students have many opportunities to develop and demonstrate competency
- Contributions to a QCE for each of our Certificate (VET) courses are stipulated in the Senior Subject Selection Guide
- Pro-rata contributions are banked for partial completion of a VET course and a Statement of Attainment is issued.

Meeting Literacy and Numeracy requirements

Literacy requirement:

 A pass (Satisfactory completion) in a General or Applied English subject in Unit 1 or Unit 2, or a grade C or above in the Unit 3 and 4 pair

Numeracy requirement

• A pass (Satisfactory completion) in a **General** or **Applied Mathematics** subject in Unit 1 or Unit 2, or a grade C or above in a Unit 3 and 4 pair

The Senior Subject Selection Guide shows the different English and Mathematics courses on offer at Shalom

Important - senior assessment

- Under the new QCE system students must complete all course requirements
- This means all students must be engaged with all the teaching and learning **AND** complete all assessment tasks as identified in the syllabus
- If there is a non-submission of assessment student receives a NR not rated.
- QCAA automatically flags this as a non-completion of course requirements:
- a) student receives a NR as their final grade for the subject, AND
- b) will not receive QCE credit for both Unit 3 & Unit 4 (2 credits)

Important - senior assessment

- Year 11 and Year 12 students are to be present for all assessments (exams) and submit assignments on or before the due date.
- Submission of drafts is an expectation, not optional.

If absent for assessment due to illness or other circumstance, there is a process to be follow to complete an Access Arrangements and Reasonable Adjustments (AARA) form. Evidence to support this absence will need to be submitted with the application.


Students are not eligible for AARA for matters that the student could have avoided, or for matters of the student's own choosing e.g.: family holidays, driving lessons/tests, magic round, family photos for formal, concerts

Making subject choices

- Choose subjects that you enjoy studying
- Choose subjects in which you are likely to be successful



- Be prepared to work hard and devote a lot more time towards your senior studies
- Don't take the easy way out and select easy options. Make sure you are opening doors with your selections. Not restricting your future options
- Don't choose subjects because your friends chose them
- Be realistic about choices, based upon performance to date
- Pick and stick* timetable lines are set after subject selection process



Pick and stick – why?

Timetable is not created until all student selections have been considered. This allows us to try and accommodation most student choices. It is only after this that the timetable is created, and lines are set.

If changes are made next year because after lines are set subjects may not be as easy to select. This may require major changes to your timetable. This is dependent on the number of classes running in the subject across the different lines.

Changing subjects could disadvantage you as units rely heavily on previous learning. If you have missed this foundational knowledge, it may be hard to catch up.

SET Plan & Interviews

- The **SET Plan process** (Senior Education and Training Plan) links to subject selection
- Issued on Personal Futures Day (Green form)
- Student reflection upon abilities, skills and successes, to inform subject selection and future planning
- Every student will attend a SET Plan interview (5 August). Parents emailed instructions on how to book an interview time
- Parents are strongly encouraged to attend the SET Plan interview
- Students ideally should have selected subjects before the interview, but they may seek advice during the interview

- Green SET Plan form A3
- Fully charged laptop
- Your online WebChoices link and code.

Edval WebChoice

- At Shalom we use WebChoices for online subject selection
- A link and code will be sent to students by Mr Maher
- The link is to a page where drop-downs allow subject choice after login
- Sections with offerings in mandatory study areas appear first
- Year 11 students study 6 subjects (list in order of preference)
- Two reserves are needed before students can submit
- The WebChoice printout must be signed and attached to the SET Plan
- WebChoices open: now
- WebChoices closes: 16 August
